



Life Expectancy Continues to Drop




Drug overdoses, suicides cause drop in 2017 US life expectancy; CDC director calls it a 'wakeup call'

Landmark Legal Decision:

 Wit v. United Behavioral Health (UBH)

 UBH is the largest managed behavioral health care company in the country.



Wit v. UBH - Case Details

- 11 plaintiffs representing over 50,000 patients.
- UBH used defective internally-developed criteria to reject coverage for mental health and addiction treatment services.
 - Inconsistent with generally accepted standards of behavioral health care.
 - Wrongly influenced by a financial incentive to suppress costs.
- Case filed under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA) of 1974 – a federal law that governs health insurance policies issued by private employers.

Wit v. UBH - Case Details

 Court stated that under generally accepted standards of care, chronic and co-existing conditions should be effectively treated, including when those conditions persist.

UBH's criteria:

- Were intended to approve coverage solely for "acute" episodes or crises.
- Improperly required reducing the level of care, e.g., removing the patient from residential treatment to some form of outpatient therapy, even if the provider believed recommended higher level of care.

Wit v. UBH - Case Details

- UBH failed to follow specific guidelines mandated by certain states for evaluating the medical necessity of behavioral health services.
- Connecticut, Illinois, and Rhode Island require criteria consistent with American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) standards.
